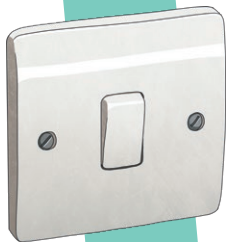


The subjunctive verb form is used to express wishes, suggestions or imagined situations. It is also used after formal verbs and following formal expressions.



If I were you, I'd try using a bigger bucket.	The rules demand that all children be in school by 9am.	It is vital that every child bring their own water bottle for Sports Day.
If you were a little bit taller, you'd be able to reach the switch.	Mr Lee requires that the class representatives go to the school council meeting this afternoon.	Is it necessary that you go to the toilet right now?
If we were a bit earlier, we might have seen the sunrise.	Might I suggest that your daughter wait inside when it's raining?	It is essential that every child walk sensibly when the fire alarm is sounding.
If you were younger, would you be scared by this story?	The headteacher proposes that each class choose a different charity to raise funds for this year.	It is important that your child bring a packed lunch on next week's school trip.
Were I a younger man, I'd have run all the way!	Could it be suggested that Class 3 love PE lessons because they have their favourite teacher?	It is essential that every child have a change of clothes for forest school sessions.
Were I the kind of person who could sew, I'd make you a new bag.	The letter states that your son wear uniform on this trip.	It is recommended that your child stay at home if symptoms persist.
I would have a go if I were braver.	I must insist that your child attend this compulsory rehearsal.	Is it essential that your child bring three cartons of juice to school every day?
